FUNERAL SERVICES HELD ON SATURDAY FOR VICTOR JOHNSON

Funeral services for Victor Johnson, who passed away suddenly at his home on Wednesday, Feb. 20th, were held at the Methodist Church on Saturday, Feb. 23rd, with Rev. Robert Vessey officiating. Musical selections were "The Old Rugged Cross" and "I Will Not Say Good Night Here But Good Night Up There" solos by Mr. Kenneth Nicholas and Mrs. Bob Ward. Pallbearers were Merle Pasco, Eddie Madsen, Walter Nelson, Elmer Andersen, E. C. Lund and Everett Verbeek. Interment was at Rose Hill cemetery with the Odd Fellow Lodge in charge of graveside rites.

Victor Johnson was born at Viborg, S. Dak., on July 20, 1885. He was the fifth of seven children of Jens and Katrina Johansen who immigrated from Denmark in 1881. He was baptized in the Methodist faith and was a member of the church. He was a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge 229 and Rebekah Lodge 170.

On July 18, 1925, he was united in marriage to Mae Nelson at Sioux City, Iowa. They engaged in farming in Spring Valley for several years.

Victor Johnson spent his entire life in Viborg and the surrounding community. In 1948 they retired from farming and for three years was custodian of the Viborg Public School until he became ill with a heart attack on May 6, 1954, from which he never fully recovered.

He was preceded in death by his parents and three brothers.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his wife Mae, his daughter, Mrs. Isabelle Sparks, Norwalk, Calif., another daughter, Mrs. Phyllis Murray, Anaheim, Calif., one son, Eugene Nelson, Sunnyvale, Calif., five grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Mary Christensen, Viborg, two brothers, Steffen of Viborg and Charley of Sioux City, and a host of relatives and friends.
