CLARENCE AALBERG MEETS WITH FA- TAL ACCIDENT

Clarence Aalberg, Living
North of Viborg Run
Over by Manure
Spreadure

DIED FROM INJURIES SUNDAY EVENING

Clarence Harold Aalberg, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Aalberg, of near Viborg met with sudden death in an accident last Sunday. He and his hired man were trying to remedy some trouble with the manure spreader when the horses became frightened and threatened to run away. In the effort to stop the team Clarence was thrown to the ground and the hind wheel of the spreader passed over his abdomen causing internal injuries. All that human aid and kind hands could do was done to save his life, but to no avail, and after twelve hours of intense suffering, which was only lessened by hypodermic injections, he passed into death's oblivion.

OBITUARY

Clarence was born April 27, 1897 and died July 27th, thus being at his death 22 years and 3 months old.

Clarence leaves a loving and fond father and mother, whose names we have already mentioned one brother, Lee, who is still in the service of his country; three sisters, Mrs. Eugene (Lydia) Stout, of College View, Nebraska; Esther, who was keeping house for him at the time of his death; and Neva, who is with her parents on the home place.

Clarence was a home-loving boy and has always been at home with his parents until this spring when he began farming for himself on the P. P. Kier place about two miles west of the home place. On Sept. 28, 1912 the deceased openly confessed his intentions of following his savior by being baptised and uniting with the Seventh-day Adventist Church. During his hours of suffering, when he could but speak with labored struggle he had several of his neighbors and friends called in and asked their forgiveness for wrongs he felt he had done them. In such an hour of grief and trial as this sad accident has occasioned, how good it is to have the assurance that the deceased is among those of whom the Lord says, "Blessed are the dead, who died in the Lord."
