"Come Into The Halls Of VHS"

As a staff of thirteen members and one advisor, we struggled to bring together the happenings locally and nationally that touched each and everyone of us. With pictures and stories, we invite you to "Come Into the Halls of VHS."

The summer brought about physical challenges as our U.S. athletes competed at the Olympics in Los Angeles. At home, an even greater struggle was overcome by the Leland "Lefty" Jorgensen family after an unfortunate motorcycle accident in July.

On September 10, the community came together to mourn the loss of a daughter, sister and good friend. On this date, Krista Olsen ended the long struggle she had fought with cancer for many years.

As the national singing stars came together to help the starving people of Africa by recording the hit song "We Are The World," the Viborg community also created their own bond. On homecoming day, helium balloons were donated by local businesses, sold and released at the beginning of the football game in memory of Krista. Money made from the event was used for a plaque and picture of Krista to be placed in the school. The remaining amount was donated to the Make a Wish Foundation.

On February 14, the community and students were faced with the loss of another friend. Dale Danielson, a 1983 VHS graduate, was shot and killed in a shooting accident near Irene.

November brought about the national election as the Reagan/Bush ticket defeated the Mondale/Ferraro delegates by a large margin. Geraldine Ferraro made history as the first woman to run for a vice-presidential seat. Also keeping their office in South Dakota are Larry Pressler and Tom Daschle.

The government was persuaded to help farmers as thousands of them gathered at the state capitol in Pierre during February. Farmers demanded lower interest rates and higher wages on grain and livestock. In turn, the state of South Dakota sent all of their legislators to Washington, D.C. to convince the President of the same things.

On the national scene a number of great advances were made medically. In Lomalinda, CA, a baboon heart was implanted in "Baby Faye's" body and she lived for approximately three weeks. The surgery was considered a success. For the first time in history, an artificial heart transplant patient, William Schroeder, was actually permitted to move out of the hospital

to a nearby apartment building.

Early in November, Greg Mellum of Irene, was thankful for the advancements of medicine. Greg was given a heart transplant in Pennsylvania, has returned home and is doing quite well.

Through the year many changes were made at VHS. In the fall, Victor the Viking, joined the cheer-leading squad. During the summer Mrs. Phyllis Hall donated her time to make our Viking mascot. Second semester some students were bused to Hurley for classes. The two school districts exchanged teachers in the areas of Spanish, chemistry, woodworking, auto mechanics and agriculture. Our seniors were restricted to classes all day as senior privileges of leaving during study halls were taken away for various reasons.




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
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VHS Educators Guide Way For Tomorrow

ing of the students. They are also involved with extra-curricular activities being class advisors, club advisors and coaches. The authoritative job of administration and teachers is a vital part of VHS.


Through devotion and concern they help the students lay a firm foundation for their future.


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

Keeping our school functioning properly, is the role of the support personnel. The recognition of these people too often goes unmentioned.


The bus drivers transport students to and from school. They are also busy driving pep, player, band and any other kind of buses needed.



ing them to try their hand at writing one.


Mrs. Nyhaug has her room full of general business students. In this class people can learn everything from how to manage their time and money to insurance and how to use their credit wisely.

By second period students are usually finally awake and able to tackle the obstacles put in front of them by their teachers. For English IV, Ms. Johnson started the new seniors with term papers.


Next they turned their attentions to Shakespeare's MacBeth. The junior's time is occupied by Mr.





with tempting aromas, first semester, for this was foods class. To complete the second semester, Mrs. Gering instructed sewing techniques to the clothing class.


This period, VHS students have an opportunity to explore their various interests. So as you can see, this is a very busy time for everyone.





Sixth Period: Hang In There

Sixth period this year at Viborg High School consists of chemistry, auto mechanics, woodworking, housing, marriage, Typing I and Ag II.

Chemistry is taught by Mr. Ward and is one of the classes combined with Hurley. The first semester, the Hurley students traveled to Viborg for the class and the second semester the Viborg students traveled to Hurley. In chemistry they learn about such things as the periodic table and its elements, atomic structure and solutions.

Auto mechanics is taught by Mr. Christensen and is the other class that is combined with Hurley. Stu-

dents from Hurley came here for the first semester and the Viborg students traveled to Hurley the second semester for woodworking also taught by Mr. Christensen. Ag II, which is taught by Mr. Stapleton is a class in which the students learn about the basic skills in agriculture.


Typing I is taught by Mrs. Nyhaug and is required for freshmen. They learn the keyboard and general


7th Period Ready For The End

The classes that fill time between 1:35 and 2:25 are, Algebra I, required for the freshmen, biology required for sophomores. Other classes are electives which occupy seventh period, Accounting I, study hall, woodworking, and ag. Auto mechanics and Spanish are also offered and are only semester courses.

3x-2bx-4b equals confusion to many of the freshmen Algebra I students. They learn about polynomials and problem solving, linear equations, inequalities, rational and irrational numbers, and last but not least, quadratic functions. English II class taught by Ms.



Geometry is instructed by Mr. Freier. This class of four juniors study the concepts of proofs, trian-


gles, proportions and theorems.

Spanish is interpreted by Mrs. Trenergy. The class was held first semester both seventh and eighth periods.


As the end of the day approaches and the 3:15 bell sounds students meet again for the last time to put away books and say their goodbyes until they return tomorrow.







As the seniors look forward to graduation, they are troubled with mixed feelings. But as it draws closer, the excitement builds and their expectations for the future are promising.





On the academic side they had a wider variety of classes to choose from. There were two required, biology and English II, with choices of typing, foods, agriculture, computer, Algebra II, and career education.


As February reminded all of Valentines Day, the sophomores started construction on the Sweetheart Ball. With the theme of "Your're the Inspiration," they decorated the

these funds to pay for the senior return party.



With the loss of only one senior, the Vikings are looking forward to a strong team next year.



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
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


In the statistical department, some

Look Into The Sport Of Cross Country




In the spring, these girls competed for their positions on the


Volleyball Sparks Interests

Among the many extracurricular activities at VHS, volleyball stands out in the minds of the girls at Viborg. This sport provides an outlet for students during the winter season.



Demonstrations by the B and C teams promise an optimistic future of volleyball at VHS. Volleyball has finally received its deserved attention through parental and community support.






All-Conference picks this year were Troy Bergh and Mark Powell. Steve Mohr and Larry Larsen were also awarded All-Conference Honorable Mention.


In District 22 action, Viborg drew a first-round bye. They then met up







The boys and girls track teams were able to see the meaning of success for the 1985 season. With excellent track weather, both teams set many new school records and brought home a number of trophies.


Four championship team trophies were brought home by the boys team. They were able to place first at the Parker Invitational, Alcester Invitational and Conference meets. A first in VHS history was also made as they managed the 1985 Region 5B Championship. Three athletes worked their way to the state meet: Mark Powell in high jump, triple jump, discus and shot put; Troy Bergh in the 1600 and 800 meter runs; and Rob Christensen in the 800 meter run. Mark placed third in the triple jump at the state meet and broke the school record with a jump of 43' 4". Troy and Rob both broke the school record at state in the 800 but did not place with time of 2:01.64 and 2:05.1 respectively.

The young girls track team also had the taste of success as they won the Alcester Invitational and tied for second at the regional meet

with the eventual state champion Sioux Falls Christian Chargers. At the region meet the Lady Vikings had four girls qualify for the state meet. Teresa Jorgensen, a double champion, qualified in the shot put and discus. Tami Jones placed second in both of the same field events to put her in the state meet. Amy Nelson won the 3200 meter run and Nikki Jones placed second in the 800 meter run to qualify for the state meet. At state, Teresa and Tami both qualified for finals in the shot put as Teresa was able to finish in third place with a throw of 37' 4". Teresa also qualified for finals in discus but was not able to place. Nikki Jones proudly placed third in the 800 meter run and also broke the school record by five seconds with a time of 2:24.71.

The track season of 1986 will be a rebuilding time for the VHS boys track team as they will be led by seniors Travis Lee and Kurt Henriksen. Points made by Teresa Jorgensen will be tough to replace for the girls team. But potential looks promising for the Lady Vikings as they are such a young team looking for only improvement.



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


Athletes Achieve High Honors



As the V became just a pile of smoldering ash and the day came to a close, the excitement turned to Friday's activities.



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

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

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

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

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



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

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

The following Wednesday the vo-



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

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
Students Arbitrate Over School Policies

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Declam Students "Have Got The Touch"



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
Students Excel In Academics

Academics are a major part of extracurricular activities and these two programs help students to grow not only mentally but also socially.




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

Little things mean a lot. This is true at VHS as statisticians, librarians and pep club go mostly unmentioned.



The Pep Club also appears at many ball games. They assist the cheer-


leaders in showing spirit and firing up the team. The Pep Club also puts on parent's night for football and boy's basketball.



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


