



"Live one day at a time," is a quote by which Krista Olsen lives. Her courage and determination, in the worst of times, have made the students of VHS admire her even more. Ironically, Krista feels God has a purpose for her suffering and because of this reason, she can smile and face each day with optimism.

Krista has an incurable cancer called ependymoma. She has two tumors, one located in her head and the other at the bottom of her spine. Operations, chemotherapy and radiation treatments, along with several months in the hospital have become quite familiar to Krista. In March of 1981, she had her first operation and since then she's undergone four more brain operations and one spinal surgery.

Krista is the daughter of Richard

and Janice Olsen. She has a brother, Marc, age 12 and one sister, Lorah, 3 years old. Biology, typing, library science and English are the courses Krista chose for her sophomore year. Each day, her mother brings her to school. With the aid of friends and a chair, Krista is able to ascend the three flights of stairs. Disabled by a tumor on the spine, walking has become difficult for her.

A wish - having a desire for something. Krista's greatest wish was to meet her favorite singer, John Denver. Because of an amazing organization called "A Wish Come True", Krista, her family and close friend, Shane Bak, were able to do just that. On January 18, they flew to Aspen, Colorado. During this time, they spent time skiing, snowmobiling and were guests at the John Denver Restaurant.

Krista's dream became a reality as she was face to face with John Denver. He sang several songs to Krista and her family, along with the 1984 Olympic song, "The Gold and Beyond." Their memories of these precious moments will be in their minds forever.

Krista is the first recipient of "A Wish Come True." She has shared her experiences with students in the Sioux Falls schools by speaking and answering questions. Krista has also helped people in similar situations face their disappointments.

If each of us would have a wish, it would be to be able to look upon the joys of life as Krista does. Each student at VHS has learned that being terminally ill is not always a disadvantage but lightens the areas for some which were once dark. Krista's smile is worth a million words.





Students Plan For Their Future

The fields of English, business, agriculture and home economics have many electives to offer at VHS. Students are able to participate in classes where their interests lie.

English is required all four years, with an elective of Advanced English. Students will study the areas of grammar, literature, drama and speech.

Accounting I and II, Typing I and II, shorthand, economics, general

business and business math are courses suggested for students with an interest in the area of business. Students are given the opportunity of on-hand business experience through the use of office packets.

Farm management is the major concern of the agricultural classes. Ag I and II and advanced ag are three of the electives where students can learn about farm machinery, insurance and judging. In shop they learn the art of welding, drafting, electric wiring and carpentry.

Home economics covers a wide variety of concerns. Sewing, cooking and child development are learned in Home Ec I. The semester courses of foods, housing, marriage and parenting are offered for upper classmen to help prepare them once they're out of high school.

These important classes help students to learn a basic education. They also discover factors that will help them in their years to come.

Students Expand Knowledge In Various Fields

VHS suggests a variety of social science, science and math classes for students interested in those areas. Government and economics are social science courses required for seniors. In these classes, they learn how the consumer functions, taxes and the operations of our U.S. Government. American History is demanded for the juniors. They learn how laws have changed, who discovered what and which President was under oath at these times. Career education was offered for the first time this year. Participants gather information on different occupations, drug education and business.

This years math department con-

sists of Algebra I and II, consumer math, geometry and advanced math, with Algebra I being the only necessity for freshmen. Students learn formulas, equations and how to apply math to their everyday life.

Two of the three science subjects, physical science and biology, are required for the students with physics being the only elective. Interested students learn about how the body operates and about chemical and physical reactions through experiments. In these classes, students are challenged mentally and are inspired by results they achieve from experiments, research and discussions.






Paul Kandy conveyed the commencement speech letting the seniors know it's O.K. to be what you are and to live for the time.
