C. I. PEDERSEN PASSED AWAY

Died at Sioux Falls Hos-
pital Sunday
Evening

C. I. Pedersen passed away at the Sioux Falls hospital at Sioux Falls last Sunday evening after an illness that has lasted over a year.

Mr. Pedersen was taken sick with pneumonia in the fall of 1924, and has been confined to his bed a good share of the time since. He consulted a number of doctors, and everything that could be possible was done for him, but to no avail. Mr. Pedersen has been a resident of this city for a number of years and up to the time he was taken sick conducted a blacksmith shop this afternoon from the home and done welding.

Funeral services are being held at the Bethania Lutheran church, and the remains will be laid to rest in the Rose Hill cemetery.

OBITUARY OF C. I. PEDERSEN---DIED NOVEMBER 22ND

Had Been Sick for About
Years—Caused by
Pneumonia

WIFE AND ONE
SON MOURN LOSS

Funeral Services Held Wed-
nesday of Last Week
From Home

Sunday, November 22nd, C. I. Pedersen, who had been sick with pneumonia for over a year, passed quietly away at the Sioux Falls hospital. His death did not come unexpected. He had been lingering for some time.

Christian Jensen Pedersen was born on March 23, 1867, at Skelby, Roskilde, Denmark. He like so many of his countrymen, soon found his way to America. Arriving in America August 27, 1891, he settled down in Waukegan, Ill. While here he was united in marriage to Miss Christine Christensen January 19, 1895. To this union were born two sons, Arthur and Einar.

Some years later, in 1908, Mr. Pedersen and family moved to Viborg, S. Dak., where he established himself as blacksmith. At this place, he and family became members of the Bethania Lutheran church.

One son, Arthur, having passed to the great beyond before him, he leaves to mourn his death his wife, one son, Einar, and one grandchild, besides two brothers, Louie and Andrew, of Racine, Wis., and a brother and sister in Denmark.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, November 25, by Rev. Hans C. Jersild at the Bethania Lutheran church, and interment at the Rose Hill cemetery.

Mr. Pedersen was known among his fellowmen as an honest, hard-working, and reliable man. He was an expert blacksmith able to repair most anything that came into his

His long seige of sickness helped to prepare him to meet his savior. We believe that he is now where sickness, sorrow and pain are no more, but "where God shall wipe away every tear from their eyes."
