The funeral will be held tomorrow (Friday) from the Lutheran church in the south part of town. A full obituary will be given next week.

OBITUARY

Carl Jorgensen Glood was born in Viborg, S. D., on July 16th, 1904 and died at the hospital at Sioux Falls on March 1st, 1916, and was 11 years, 7 months and 14 days old. Carl's childhood and boyhood days were all spent here in Viborg with his parents and brothers and sisters, and are remembered by them as a good and ambitious son and brother. He has attended the Viborg public schools since his 6½ year. He also attended Rev. Kristensen's Danish school and was a steady Sunday school pupil of the M. E. Sunday school, and he always spoke of Rev. Folkestad as one of his best friends.

The happy home surroundings received a hard blow from this sudden departure of their youngest son. He was taken sick with the la grippe during last Christmas and has not been feeling well since, it also seemed that he lost all his earlier ambition.

On the 25th of February he was taken to the hospital at Sioux Falls, accompanied by his father, to undergo an operation for appendicitis the next day. The operation was, from all indications, successful and his father returned home Monday morning with the idea that Carl would return home in about ten days as a cured boy. The same morning his mother went up to see him and stay with him a few days, but that same afternoon he was suddenly overtaken with heavy pains, which resulted in the loss of speech and loss of all power so he was unable to move. Four doctors were called in consultation at once, but none could account for his sudden attack or the cause of it until after further investigation and examination it proved to be kidney troubles of long standing, which had now with the aid of the la grippe come to its last stage, and no doctor or specialist was able to master or save the boy's life and after two nights and two days of hard struggle he passed quietly away on the morning of March 1st. His last words that his parents could distinguish were: "God is coming" and this he repeated several times.

His parents, three brothers and four sisters realize that by the passing of Carl to the great beyond they lose in this life the company of a good and loving son and brother, who will long be remembered by them.

The funeral took place last Friday from the house at 1 o'clock and the remains were taken to the Lutheran church where in the absence of Rev. Kristensen Rev. Folkestad preached a most touching sermon, and spoke words of comfort to the parents and relatives of the deceased, as well as the many friends there assembled. The large church was filled to overflowing with friends who came to pay their last respect to Carl and extend sympathy to the bereaved family. The schools were dismissed during the services and his schoolmates and teachers attended in a body.

The church was beautifully decorated with cut flowers and the floral offerings were most profuse.

In closing the choir sang, "It is just like Jesus to roll the clouds away," which was Carl's favorite Sunday school song.
