


"Break It To Me Gently"


May 15 closed the end of an era for 21 dedicated classmates. Many tears were shed as they said goodbye, but held on to their memories. These seniors were "some kind of friends."




Classes resume at 12:20 with a few grumbles along with anticipation of the day's end. Seventh period is basically a miscellaneous

The musty smell of the locker room and tapping of cleats was the first sign of the beginning of the 1982 football season. This scene didn't linger for long, as the boys took the first step onto the awaiting practice field. The long, vigorous training appeared to have payed off in the end.

The team was led into their victorious season by co-captains Troy Lee and Brad Hartmann. These men showed leadership qualities as Troy came out on top with 941 yards rushing followed by Brad's 455 yards. In addition to these accomplishments, Troy led with 90 tackles and Brad downed the opponents with 62.

The Vikings reached their dream as they were ranked number one in the state for the class 9A division. To reach this goal they defeated 8 out of 9 teams. 
"Let's Get Physical"




