




We, the annual staff of 1979-80, put together this book to capture just a fraction of all the memories of one year at VHS. While these pages appear in the beginning of your book, they are the last written and probably the hardest.

In September, the editor and assistant editors and general staff were assembled together to choose a

theme. "Soap Operas" was selected and carried on through the book. This idea of having a theme was new for the VHS yearbook and was brought about by Lori Alton and Julie Rasmussen who attended a workshop the preceding summer.

VHS welcomed three new teachers, Miss Glenda Johnson, Miss Karen Gramstad and Mr. Terry Stoterau, into the doors. Being young adults, they brought new enthusiasm and a bright outlook for the students.

As an agricultural community, Viborg always takes a chance in farming and raising livestock. For this reason, students are forced to work on the farms with their parents and the non-farming students to find work elsewhere. Drawing the school closer together is the energy not only for work but for the activities of the school. The size of VHS, approximately 100 stu-



students, keeps this close knit feeling and causes students and teachers to rely strongly on one another.

Once again the gas shortage was a factor in the lives of everyone. For this reason, double dating and staying close to home became popular again.

On November 4, 1979, only two months into the school year, a world crisis happened. Fifty of our American citizens were taken captive to live through our complete school year and longer, in a shocking and brutal Iranian society. Late April, a failing attempt was made to free our fifty male citizens. Eight United States lives were taken in the secret effort. By ridiculing the USA even more, they displayed our comrades with crudeness. It may be months or even years before the families of these captives will ever come together again.

As result of not only the Iranian crisis but the

Soviets invasion into Afghanistan, President Carter and his cabinet decided to boycott the 1980 Olympics held in Moscow.

1980 being an election year, put added pressures to the American people. They must decide which person can help put the United States back on its feet again.

On a personal note, with all the turmoil in the world, VHS got involved in world affairs but also strengthened their unity at home. Throughout the year, success and eagerness proved to be prosperous for each individual of the school system.

Going to Prairie Village the first day of school was one of the interesting trips for the seniors. Steam merry-go-round, flea market and all the antiques were part of the fun for the day.


The annual Pierre trip was changed this year. Instead of staying over night, the seniors spent only one day visiting the capitol with the Hurley seniors.



Sticking with the homecoming theme of comics, they built "I Thot




"I Saw A Viking, I Did, I Did!" which placed third in competition.






