





Treasured photographs and everlasting memories are the basis of every yearbook. For this reason, the 1981-82 yearbook staff chose the theme of "Photographs and Memories." With their hard work and dedication, they have tried to put your many VHS remembrances into one small book.

As things were running smoothly on the VHS basketball court and football field, things were different in the Mt. Vernon area. John Mathis' wife and two preschool sons were shot to death in their home on September 7. Mathis was arrested and charged with the murders but was acquitted on May 13. Authorities have yet to determine the killer.

In October, the news finger pointed a little closer to home as the police force determined that illegal drugs were being dealt in Viborg. A number of people were arrested on March 12, 1982, but were released on bail. The trials of each of these individuals will last for sometime and are yet to be decided.

VHS students brought themselves in the light of local and national news as they boycotted the traditional Friday noon meal of tuna and noodles on January 29. The high school students saw and learned exactly how the media can distort and make their news as they visited and filmed the senior class preparing their own noon meal.

With winter weather cooperating, very few snow days were used. The Viborg students were dismissed from school as early as May 19. May 21, brought a shock to Turner County as the Lund Theater was struck by fire after 65

years of operation. Rewiring has been started to prepare for service once again.

In the national scene, two of our movie stars, John Belushi and Natalie Wood, tragically lost their lives. The Voyager I and II passed by Jupiter and Saturn and the Space Shuttle Columbia made two more successful trips into space and back.

Reaganomics, President Ronald Reagan's policy concerning our U.S. budget, was the talk for the people everywhere. He cut back on the spending of many federally funded programs. College students found this affecting them as they will have to look elsewhere for loans and grants for funds for college.

As you read this book and look back on the year of 1981-82, we hope we have captured these events as vividly as possible. "The Viking" is prepared for you, the individual, and the school as a collection of these "Photographs and Memories."

managed to play their best and challenge each and every team they met.







One main event the student council had to smooth out this year was the food boycott. They met with the cooks and all came to a decision that was the best






