Otto Nelson, 76, pioneer resident of the Viborg community, passed away early Wednesday morning, Aug. 7th, at the Viborg Hospital. He had been a patient for some months.

Funeral services will be held from the First Baptist Church on Friday, 2:00 P. M., with Rev. Ben Zimmerman officiating.

Services were conducted at the Viborg Funeral Home on Friday, Aug. 9, at 1:30 P. M., and at the First Baptist Church at 2:00 P. M. Rev. Zimmerman officiated. Mrs. L. J. Rasmussen sang "Near to the Heart of God" and "No Light There", accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Ben Zimmerman.

Otto Nelson, 76, retired businessman, died in the Viborg hospital Wednesday morning following an illness of three months duration.

He was born on a farm 3 miles south of Viborg on Oct. 23, 1880, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lars Nielson. He grew to manhood in Turner County. On Dec. 5, 1906, he was married to Keturah Christensen. To this union 4 children were born.

He spent his life farming and was in business for 25 years in Viborg. He was a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge and the D. B. S. Lodge.

Preceding him in death were his 4 children, 3 infants and daughter Lu Verne, his parents and 2 brothers.

Survivors are the widow Keturah, and he also leaves to mourn his passing a host of relatives and friends.
