Agnes Estella Flyger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Flyger was born at her home near Viborg, S. Dak., October 14, 1897. With the exception of a few years when she was away for medical treatment she lived with her parents at her home where she passed away at 5 minutes to 8, Tuesday morning, September 1st, 1925, at the age of 27 years, 10 months, 17 days.

At a tender age it was noticed that Agnes was afflicted with hip joint disease. This always troubled her more or less until she reached the age of 13 years, when after taking serum treatments the disease seemed to be arrested and she enjoyed good health for 9 years. This was the most enjoyable time of her short life as her health at this time permitted her to finish her education as stenographer and bookkeeper at the State Normal at Springfield, S. D. After returning home she was offered a position at the First National Bank of Viborg which she accepted and where she remained for several years.

At this time she decided she could be benefitted by taking treatments at the McLain Sanitarium at St. Louis, Missouri, where she stayed for 13 months. At this time her health began to fail and it has been gradually failing ever since. During her residence at St. Louis she accepted the Third Angel's Message and on the 26th day of June 1920, she was baptized and received as a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church of which she was a faithful member up to the time of her death.

The last five years of Agnes's life were years of pain and suffering, but she bore it all patiently, being content with the thought that God's way is best. Her thoughts were never of self, but always of others. During the entire time of her sickness she met all her sufferings with a cheerful spirit and often during her hours of pain her hands were busy with work for the relief and enjoyment of others.

With a gentleness that betokened her disposition, a humility that showed her submission to God's will and with her Bible as her constant companion, her life was an example that all would do well to follow.

One of the last days before her death she expressed her wishes in regard to her favorite hymns being sung and her pastor being present.

At the last minute as her gentle spirit was ebbing away, her mother said, "Goodbye, dear Agnes, at last you have blessed rest in Jesus." A most beautiful radiance spread over her face as she smilingly breathed the answer, "Yes", and was at rest.

She leaves to mourn her loss her father and mother, one brother and three sisters. Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Flyger, Arthur Flyger, Mrs. Ruben Woodward, Mrs. Carl Knutson and her twin sister, Mrs. Chris Anderson and a host of relatives and friends.
